Private McGraw was performing duty on Remagen Range d was responsible for supervising the training of basic recruits in live fragmtation grenade handling. A trainee undergoing instruction tossed an acated grenade which hit the top of the protective barricade and bounced back to the throwing bay, endangering the lives of all personnel in that area. tickly realizing the immediate danger involved, Private McGraw unhesitatingly outed the alarm. Without concern for his own personal safety, he lunged ward approximately ten feet, seized the grenade and, with only seconds to are, tossed it out into the impact area where it instantly exploded. Private Graw's quick judgment, presence of mind and courageous action in this sudh emergency prevented serious injury or death to personnel within the area, d reflect distinct credit upon himself and the military service.
