Captain William S. Carpenter, Jr., . Infantry (then First Lieutenant), United States Army, distinguished himself by gallantry in action while engaged in military operations in Vietnam on 28 December 1963. While accompanying a Vietnamese heliborne parachute battalion on a military mission, Captain Carpenter demonstrated fortitude, perseverance, and professional skill. When the helicopter landed and the Vietnamese element was proceeding to its objective, it was suddenly subjected to intense small arms fire by hostile forces. As the unit faltered momentarily, Captain Carpenter bravely exposed himself to the danger and rallied the forces by taking the lead position and encouraging the unit to follow his rapid pace. Although he received a bullet wound through his right arm while in this dangerous position, he completely ignored his own wound and, when he spotted the insurgent who shot him, he successfully dislodged him from a hole and prevented further hostile action from materializing. He then repeated his dauntless actions by organizing the soldiers in the area at which time another bullet struck his radio and knocked him to the ground. Despite his own personal injury and the hazardous conditions, he continued his diligent efforts and inspired the troops to defend their homeland until he succeeded in contacting the Senior Battalion Advisor before accepting evacuation by helicopter. Captain Carpenter's conspicuous gallantry and unselfish actions are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

VIII\_SOLDIER'S MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Major Colin C. Campbell, (then Captain), Artillery, Missouri Army National Guard, distinguished himself by heroism at Camp Ripley, Minnesota, on 6 August 1963, while attending annual active duty for training. When Major Campbell witnessed the crash of a light Army aircraft within the proximity of his location, he rushed to the downed plane to render assistance and saw its engine in flames. With complete disregard for his own personal safety and ignoring the danger of a gasoline explosion, he unhesitatingly approached the burning aircraft to participate with others on the scene in extracting the pilot. Despite the intense heat and smoke filled cabin, he assisted in freeing the aviator from the safety harness and carrying him away from the burning aircraft moments before it was entirely engulfed in flames. Major Campbell's prompt and heroic action in this emergency is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

Specialist Four Glenn L. Clark, , United States Army, as a member of Headquarters and Service Company, United States Army Support Group, Joint Security Area, Armistice Affairs Division, United Nations Command, distinguished himself by heroism on 26 January 1964, in Korea. When Specialist Clark heard an explosion soon after becoming separated from a hunting companion, he raced toward the direction of the sound, and then, with complete disregard for his own personal safety, entered a mine field to rescue his comrade who had been seriously injured by stepping on a mine. Upon reaching the injured soldier and discovering the seriousness of the wounds, Specialist Clark consoled him momentarily, fired three shots as a distress signal, and then ran to a populated area for help. When he encountered the unit commander who had heard the signal and was proceeding to the area in a jeep,

they returned to the mine field. Specialist Clark then unhesitatingly repeated his courageous efforts and fortitude by re-entering the mine field and carrying his companion to the waiting jeep. Through his prompt actions and sound judgment in obtaining help to expedite the evacuation of his companion to a medical facility, he was instrumental in saving the life of the injured man. Specialist Clark's heroic conduct in this emergency is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the award of the Army Commendation Medal to Specialist Clark for outstanding courage on 26 January 1964 as announced in General Orders Number 35, Headquarters, Eighth United States Army, dated 23 April 1964.)

Staff Sergeant Eldon L. Coy, , Missouri Army National Guard, distinguished himself by heroism at Camp Ripley, Minnesota, on 6 August 1963, while attending annual active duty for training. When Sergeant Coy witnessed the crash of a light Army aircraft within the proximity of his location, he rushed to the downed plane to render assistance and saw its engine in flames. With complete disregard for his own personal safety and ignoring the danger of a gasoline explosion, he unhesitatingly approached the burning aircraft to participate with others on the scene in extracting the pilot. Despite the intense heat and smoke filled cabin, he assisted in freeing the aviator from the safety harness and carrying him away from the burning aircraft moments before it was entirely engulfed in flames. Sergeant Coy's prompt and heroic action in this emergency is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

Private First Class Francisco Delgado-Roldan, , United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism on 4 February 1964 while serving as a member of a Research Operations Detachment on board a United States Navy vessel operating in tropical waters. Private Delgado-Roldan was standing on the main deck watching a group of people come aboard from a small boat anchored at sea when a female passenger suddenly lost her grip on the pilot's ladder and plunged into the water between the ship and the smaller craft. With complete disregard for his own personal safety, he unhesitatingly dove into the water along with another male passenger to rescue the woman who had failed to see a life ring which had been tossed to her. As the strong current carried them away from the ship and it appeared that both the woman and the man were about to submerge in the shark infested waters, Private Delgado-Roldan demonstrated fortitude and perseverance by reaching the victims and keeping them affoat for over ten minutes until they were rescued by boat. His prompt and heroic action in this emergency is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

Private First Class James H. McGee, , United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism on 28 March 1964, in Seward, Alaska, while assigned to the Seward Recreation Center. On the day after the treacherous earthquake which devastated Alaska, Private McGee unhesitatingly volunteered to participate in a rescue mission to evacuate a severely injured crewman from a fuel vessel which had been subjected to explosions and fire while anchored in the debris choked channel of Resurrection Bay. Despite the aftershocks and the violence of the turbulent waters, he joined the rescue party in a twenty-foot launch that had been washed ashore. Throughout the two-mile trip which took two hours, he displayed perseverance and rendered invaluable assistance in guiding the rescue craft toward the hazardous vessel to reach the

victim. After the injured seaman was lowered into the launch, he again displayed complete disregard for his own personal safety by willingly remaining aboard the fuel tanker because of the limited weight and space capacity of the rescue boat. Private McGee's heroic action and deep concern for his fellow man are in the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army.

Major Jesse H. Otte, (then Captain), Artillery, United States Army, Missouri Army National Guard, distinguished himself by heroism at Camp Ripley, Minnesota, on 6 August 1963, while attending annual active duty for training. When Major Otte witnessed the crash of a light Army aircraft within the proximity of his location, he rushed to the downed plane to render assistance and saw its engine in flames. With complete disregard for his own personal safety and ignoring the danger of a gasoline explosion, he unhesitatingly approached the burning aircraft to participate with others on the scene in extracting the pilot. Despite the intense heat and smoke filled cabin, he assisted in freeing the aviator from the safety harness and carrying him away from the burning aircraft moments before it was entirely engulfed in flames. Major Otte's prompt and heroic action in this emergency is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

Private First Class Michael J. Smith. United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism on 28 March 1964, in Seward, Alaska, while assigned to the Seward Recreation Center. On the day after the treacherous earthquake which devastated Alaska, Private Smith unhesitatingly volunteered to participate in a rescue mission to evacuate a severely injured crewman from a fuel vessel which had been subjected to explosions and fire while anchored in the debris choked channel of Resurrection Bay. Despite the aftershocks and the violence of the turbulent waters, he joined the rescue party in a twenty-foot launch that had been washed ashore. Throughout the two-mile trip which took two hours, he displayed perseverance and rendered invaluable assistance in guiding the rescue craft toward the hazardous vessel to reach the victim. After the injured seaman was lowered into the launch, he continued to display determination and fortitude while guiding the rescue craft back to the shore. Private Smith's heroic action and deep concern for his fellow man are in the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army.

Sergeant Solomona Uli, , United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism in Korea, on 30 July 1963, while serving as a Squad Leader of Company A, 1st Battle Group, 8th Cavalry, 1st Cavalry Division. Sergeant Uli demonstrated courage, sound judgment, and professional skill when three soldiers became trapped inside an uncharted minefield near the South Tape of the Demilitarized Zone while conducting an area search for a North Korean patrol which had infiltrated the Battle Group's sector. With outstanding leadership, he immediately ordered the men not to move. Then, with perseverance and complete disregard for his own personal safety, he began the dangerous and tedious task of probing for mines through heavy foliage and underbrush. After probing approximately thirty-five meters into the minefield, he reached his three comrades and led them to safety through the area he had probed. Sergeant Uli's unselfish and heroic actions in this hazardous situation are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself

and the military service. (This award supersedes award of the Army Commendation Medal awarded for heroism on 30 July 1963, as announced in General Orders Number 116, Headquarters 1st Cavalry Division, APO 24, dated 26 November 1963.)

Private First Class John C. Willoughby. . United States Army. distinguished himself by heroism on 28 March 1964, in Seward, Alaska, while assigned to the Seward Recreation center. On the day after the treacherous earthquake which devastated Alaska, Private Willoughby unhesitatingly volunteered to participate in a rescue mission to evacuate a severely injured crewman from a fuel vessel which had been subjected to explosions and fire while anchored in the debris choked channel of Resurrection Bay. Despite the aftershocks and the violence of the turbulent waters, he joined the rescue party in a twenty-foot launch that had been washed ashore. Throughout the two-mile trip which took two hours, he displayed perseverance and rendered invaluable assistance in guiding the rescue craft toward the hazardous vessel to reach the victim. After the injured seaman was lowered into the launch, he continued to display determination and fortitude while guiding the rescue craft back to the shore. Private Willoughby's heroic action and deep concern for his fellow man are in the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army.

X\_BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 11046, 24 August 1962, the Bronze Star Medal with "V" device for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against hostile forces is awarded to:

, (then Platoon Sergeant First Class Joseph W. L. Godbout, Sergeant), United States Army, distinguished himself by heroic achievement while engaged in military operations in Vietnam on 20 July 1963, and serving as an Advisor to a Battalion of the Republic of Vietnam Army. After accompanying Vietnamese elements on a military operation to render advice in the defense of their homeland, Sergeant Godbout unhesitatingly returned to the Battalion Command Post which had sustained heavy casualties from intense hostile gun fire. With professional competence and perseverance, he actively assisted in organizing and preparing for the medical evacuation of over seventy Vietnamese wounded and dead. Although exposed to gun fire, he completely disregarded his own personal safety, directed the walking wounded to the Battalion Aid Station, and acted as liaison to insure the rapid, controlled movement of casualties to the helicopter landing zones. The selection of these zones was based upon his reconnaissance and recommendations. By instilling confidence and determination in his Vietnamese comrades, the objective was secured and the medical evacuation successfully completed with the failure of the hostile forces to strike a single helicopter. Sergeant Godbout's personal example, courageous actions, and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army.

, Infantry, (then First Lieutenant), Captain John G. Coombs. United States Army, distinguished himself by heroic achievement while engaged in military operations in Vietnam on 20 July 1963. As an Advisor to a Battalion of the Republic of Vietnam Army, Captain Coombs rendered invaluable assistance to Vietnamese elements when they sustained heavy casualties from intense gun fire by hostile forces during a military operation. With fortitude and complete disregard for his own personal safety, he moved forward to within forty meters of the hostile forces to survey the situation and check friendly casualties. The success of these efforts enabled him to provide the Battalion Commander with sound advice and timely assistance in moving his reserves, adjusting the position of units, and relieving the pressure on the troops pinned down in the open. When this was accomplished, Captain Coombs again moved forward under gun fire to organize the collection of casualties and direct their evacuation to the rear along routes he had reconnoitered. The selection of helicopter evacuation landing zones was based upon his reconnaissance and recommendations. Through his courageous action, sound military advice, and assistance, he instilled confidence and determination in his Vietnamese comrades and was highly instrumental in the success of their military operation. Captain Coombs' bravery, professional competence, and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army.
